Photography 1 — 2022-2023 Spring — Fred Kral — The Marin School

Course Description

This class is an introduction to a wide range of topics in photography. The creative process and the making of digital images for the arts form the core of the course. Students are guided to hone their skills in producing impactful images, usually digital. On the technical side, students practice the operation of digital cameras and basic lighting techniques. They learn how to use digital editing techniques to enhance and alter their images. Students share and discuss their photography work frequently. Through visual aids and discussions, students gain familiarity with the critique process. Students explore the historical and contemporary art of photography as an effective form of communication used by professionals and non-professionals alike. Assignments demonstrate mastery of technical skills and creative expression. Students complete major projects. They regularly present and exhibit their work beyond the classroom.

Major Topics

After an introduction to the elements of art and the principles of design, the course surveys types of photography. The major topics are the *Art of Photography, Still Life Photography, Portraits, Landscapes/Architecture, Action Photography, Photojournalism, and Commercial Photography.* The Artistic Processes (see Assessment), including technical skills, are woven into the course. Students give input on what topics we study as a class and they choose their individual concentration in later projects.

- Halide Mark II Pro Camera app for iPhone. Subscription, \$12/year. Required.
 - o Android camera app: Find an app with raw files, manual exposure & focus, macro.
- VSCO.co online photo editing and sharing account. Subscription, \$30/year. Required.
- Adobe Lightroom Mobile installed on your smartphone. Use school Adobe ID. No cost. Required.
- Adobe Creative Suite/Photoshop installed on laptop. Use school Adobe ID. No cost. Required.

Know that it is against the class and school policy to work on tasks that are not assigned or directly related to the course.
